C. OUTLINE OF MAJOR CONTENT AREAS

1. Introduction to various significant literary genres of authors through novels, poems, short stories, and historical text.
2. Read, discuss, analyze, and write about Chicano history and literary works.
3. Study the history, sociocultural context and significance of Chicano literature.
4. Study the major themes in Chicano literary tradition, with emphasis on the contemporary period (post-1960).
5. Examine the relationship between Anglo and Chicano cultures as expressed in Chicano literature.
6. Discuss and analyze language (Spanglish and Code Switching) as a tool of empowerment.
7. Understand the contributions of Chicano authors to Hispanic and American letters.

D. LEARNING OUTCOMES (General)

1. Students will articulate one's cultural heritage and how it affects one's worldview, assumptions and biases.
2. Understand the causes, manifestations, and impacts of prejudicial exclusion, structural inequalities, and systemic oppression.
3. Demonstrate knowledge of the experiences and contributions of many groups that shape societies and cultures, in particular those groups that have been historically excluded and oppressed.
4. Demonstrate intercultural communication skills (verbal and non-verbal) for interacting with those culturally different from one's self.
5. Recognize stereotypes and critically assess cultural images.
