## ENGL 2270: Modern American Literature

1. The academic content of this course varies and may be organized either historically or topically. Topics may include American literature of the 1920s, American literature of World War II, anti-war literature of the twentieth and twenty-first centuries, literature of dissent, contemporary American authors and their writings.
